
Scouts O

The final weekend of January saw 3rd Kenton Scouts head out to Paccar for their Winter Warmer (indoor) camp. cooking




Highlights included making chocolate decorations,

















and a hike Sunday morning (with a coffee stop) where we met a very friendly horse







USEFUL INFORMATION

Nights Away Permits

Do you want to take your young people on an overnight stay adventure? After all that is what Scouting is all about. If you do, then you will need a Nights Away Permit, it shows people in Scouting, the young people and their parents that you have the necessary skills and experience to be able to lead these important events. There are several stages of permit you can obtain relevant to the nights away you are going to run, whether you are staying in indoors accommodation, camping at a Scout Campsite, camping on a farmer's field or camping out as part of a light weight expedition.

There are four categories of permit:

- Indoor for staying in a building that has built in lighting and cooking facilities, toilets plumbed into a waste disposal system and running drinking water
- Campsite for staying at a site that has toilets plumbed into a waste disposal system and access to running drinking water
- **Green Field** for staying at any site where any of the above facilities do not exist for example, a summer camp on a farmer's field
- **Lightweight Expedition** for staying at any site for not more than one night before moving on. The core activity is a form of expedition, not residential, and all the equipment is transported with the participants. e.g. DofE hikes, expedition hikes, canoe expeditions

Those holding a Green Field Permit may lead residential events in the other three categories. Those holding a Camp Site Permit may also run indoor residential events. Those holding a Hillwalking Permit that includes lightweight camping in remote areas may also run Lightweight Expedition events. The process to gain the permit is the same for whichever type of permit you are applying for.

New Permits

There are no fixed, firm pre-requisites or required training ahead of gaining a Nights Away Permit, but it is recommended that you complete Module 16 (Residential Experiences) and Module 38 (Skills for Residential Experiences) to ensure you have the basic knowledge in theory. In addition to this, valuable experience can be gained by being part of the leadership team for residential events being run by someone else who holds a Nights Away Permit. Looking at this the other way around, gaining a permit is one way of validating modules 16 and 38.

After deciding which kind of permit you wish to apply for, you will need to plan and run a residential experience of that same type that is assessed by a Nights Away Adviser. The Nights Away Adviser will visit you about 2 weeks before the overnight stay to review your planning and look at your paperwork and will also visit you at your overnight stay to review how it is being run in practice. During this assessment you will be assessed for your skills, knowledge and experience. This assessment is not supposed to trick you or catch you out. It is to assess your level of technical competence, and your Nights Away Adviser should also be able to support and provide advice to you throughout the process of planning, running and evaluating an event, as well as assessing you.

USEFUL INFORMATION

New Permits Continued

Following a successful review, the Nights Away Adviser will recommend the permit type and any restrictions required. This will then be passed to the DC or their Deputy, who will check you hold the relevant Scout requirements, e.g. DBS, etc and they will then add the Nights Away Permit to Compass.

Only Permits that are held on Compass are classed as Valid Permits, and are able to be used to run Nights Away events.

Permit Renewals

A permit is time limited up to a maximum of five years at which point it will expire automatically if it is not renewed. If you wish to continue leading nights away events for young people you will need to apply for a new permit.

Renewal of a permit is conducted in the same way as the initial application, except the form of assessment is likely to differ. The permit holder will need to complete an application form and the Nights Away Adviser will consider the experience of the applicant and decide the most appropriate form of assessment. However, if the new permit is to exactly the same level as the old permit and you have been running residential events, there may be no need for a practical assessment. That decision is up to the Nights Away Adviser.

It is the Permit holder's responsibility to ensure that their Permit is valid at the time they run the Nights Away event. It is the GSL's and DESC's responsibility to ensure the events are being run by the holder of a valid Permit.

Valid Permits

If you think you hold a Nights Away Permit, that is not shown on Compass, then please contact Alan Sims, who will assess the evidence you have available, and will advise the next steps you need to follow to get this Permit approved and added to Compass. If your evidence is insufficient Alan will advise how you can obtain a Valid Permit and have it registered on Compass. Not all cases will require starting from scratch, it depends upon the experience you have relevant to the permit.
